### GambleAware funds new PhD student

London, 20 March: GambleAware is funding a new PhD student. Scott Houghton at Northumbria University will assess the impact of social media upon gambling behaviour and the potential for social media to be used to promote positive gambling behavioural changes. It will also explore the effectiveness for gambling of the kinds of emotive messaging that has influenced behaviour change for issues such as smoking.

GambleAware funds PhDs to allow the in-depth exploration of research questions, and to develop the researcher's abilities and knowledge, thus increasing research capacity in the field of gambling studies.

Following an open tender, the decision was made to award the PhD by GambleAware's Research and Evaluation Committee.

# Clare Wyllie, Director of Research and Evaluation, said:

"This study is very relevant as it will explore how best social media, widely used to market gambling, could also be used to bring about positive behaviour change for safer gambling. Importantly, it is also learning from what has been effective for other public health issues and seeing whether or how such techniques could be used to influence gambling behaviour".
