GambleAware publishes Educari evaluation of education initiatives

London, 13 September: GambleAware has published Educari's evaluation of two youth education initiatives which were carried out between 2015 and 2018:

- Fast Forward developed a gambling education toolkit and delivered training to practitioners including teachers and youth workers across Scotland; and,
- Demos developed and piloted resources, lesson plans and guidance for teachers to support the delivery of gambling education in schools in England and Wales.

The evaluation found that the two projects were well-conducted, and that they were useful tests of different ways of promoting and supporting gambling education for young people. While it is unrealistic to expect that short-term school curriculum-based interventions aimed at all pupils will significantly influence behaviour, it was shown that the Demos lessons significantly improved pupils' knowledge of where to seek help should gambling become a problem for them or their friends.

GambleAware intends to continue to support and promote the use of these materials, in line with its strategic ambition to develop a Knowledge Hub of resources and best practice for use in a range of settings, from youth education to health promotion. GambleAware recently announced further funding which will allow Fast Forward to scale up its activity to deliver prevention at scale across Scotland, in line with the recommendations from Educari's evaluation. Importantly, these resources allow those responsible for educating young people about a range of health and wellbeing related topics to integrate gambling into programmes of work alongside other risky behaviours, such as alcohol education.

Both the Gambling Toolkit and the lesson plans together with teacher guidance are available to download for free at infohub.gambleaware.org/resources. The resources took account of feedback from previous education initiatives which found that teachers and youth workers would be more inclined to use resources if they had clear links to the curriculums in England, Scotland and Wales. The Gambling Toolkit

developed by Fast Forward ensures every activity links directly to the Scottish Curriculum for Excellence, which is used by all youth practitioners, including teachers.

GambleAware has contributed to the recent consultation on PSHE education in England by the Department for Education, calling for gambling to be included as part of the curriculum. GambleAware is also in conversation with Welsh government about how education about the risks related to gambling can be best represented on the new Curriculum for Wales, which is currently in development.

Dr Jane Rigbye, Director of Education at GambleAware, said: "GambleAware is delighted that the results of this evaluation confirm the quality and potential of these resources, and networks developed while producing them, to make a real impact to the way in which young people think and behave in relation to gambling. Teaching children about gambling must be done carefully, because there is a known risk of inadvertently promoting the very thing you are trying to warn children about, so GambleAware has approached this with great caution, and this evaluation provides critical reassurance that this risk is being minimised with the materials being recommended. GambleAware looks forward to continuing to work with Demos, Fast Forward and other organisations with the aim of reducing the experience of gambling-related harms amongst young people."
